 There is so much to learn about Ancient Egypt! This Webquest is designed to help you discover and experience just a part of the great civilization.




 Your task in this Webquest is to create an Egyptian portfolio full of artifacts and information all about Ancient Egypt.

Process

- There are 10 steps in this webquest.
- Each step has a first section where you will read and write about the information.
- The second section is the mini-project some steps have one mini-project, sometimes you can choose between two options.

Step One: The Níle

Step 5 - Project 1 Old Kingdom



- The Old Kingdom was the time of the Pyramid. Now it's your chance to build your own pyramid!!
- Using a brown construction paper, design your own 3D pyramid. Be creative and EXACT - the ancient engineers certainly had to be! That means all the sides must be the same size and match perfectly to the base. It does not matter how big the pyramid is.

Step 5 - Project 2 New Kingdom During the New Kingdom, the kings and queens were buried in the Valley of the Kings in hidden tombs. It was important to keep their tombs hidden from tomb raiders. Draw your own tomb "blue print" including hidden entrances, secret rooms, or any other "tricks" you want to use to keep the tomb

raíders away from your treasures!

Step Six: Gods and Goddesses



- Ancient Egypt was polytheistic (poly thee is tick), or in other words, they believed in many gods and goddesses.
 Click on the picture above to read the creation story.
- Click on the picture below, choose a god or goddess and create an information page using Google Docs (10 facts and 2 pictures) about them including their hieroglyphic symbols, a description of what they look like, a paragraph describing what they are the god of and why they are imp



Step Seven: Scarab Beetle



- Click on the picture of the beetle and read about the Scarab Beetle.
 Write a fat paragraph describing the beetle and its habits as well as why the Ancient Egyptians thought they were so important.
- Click on the amulet below to watch a video about Scarab Beetles.
- Making an Amulet: 1. use a piece of clay to form the shape, use the wood stick to put a hole through the amulet for the string. 2. Use a toothpick to draw designs on the beetle. 3. Wait for clay to dry. Use watercolors to color your amulet.

Step Eight: Mummies

Okay, you hear the word mummy and you think of King Tut or a scary movie about a cursed, stiff-legged walking Egyptian bundle of dirty bandages.

Just for the record, there are a lot of other types of mummies that have been intentionally, or accidentally processed in sand, tar, mud, freeze-dried in a cave, or sacrificed in a bog. Even the recently discovered mammoth in Siberia is considered a mummy. Not to be mistaken for a fossil or skeleton, which have no remaining flesh, organs or muscles preserved. A mummy is simply a preserved old dead body. (animal or human)

Think about it, since the beginning of time man has not wanted to die or accept death. At the end of every life comes death . . .a fascination with the dead continues with the living! With a nicely preserved body, death was easier to accept - it was just a step into the next eternal life.

 Click on the picture on the left and read about how mummies were made. On a lined-piece of paper answer the 15 questions the website talks about.



Next click on the mummy on the right and go through the process of mummification. Make sure you don't skip the intro - you need all the info you can get!



Step 8 - Weighing of the Heart

- Before you go on, you need to know what the ancient Egyptians believed happened in the afterlife.
- Click on the picture below and read about the "Weighing of the Heart" ceremony.
- Make a list of the sequence of events that take place in the ceremony, including who is there and what happens.
